

Ohio EPA's New Director

In December 2022, Governor Mike DeWine appointed Anne M. Vogel as the director of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. She most recently served as Policy Director for Governor DeWine during his first term, driving implementation of the DeWine/Husted agenda for Ohio. Chief among them is the creation and launch of H2Ohio, the Governor's water quality initiative that brings together

the Ohio EPA, Ohio Department of Agriculture and Ohio Department of Natural Resources to improve Ohio's water quality through the creation of wetlands, the reduction in phosphorus runoff, and access to clean drinking water and quality sewer systems. Vogel also served as Infrastructure Coordinator for Governor DeWine, overseeing a cross-agency team charged with securing federal grants for infrastructure improvements across the state.

Director Vogel spent a decade at American Electric Power Company, with experience in both regulatory matters and operations. She was responsible for federal energy policy development in Washington. Following law school, Anne started her career as a litigator at the Columbus law firm of Porter Wright and subsequently clerked for Judge Sargus, U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Ohio.

Vogel holds a law degree from Capital University and an MBA from The Ohio State University.

Environmental Justice in Air Permitting

Securing environmental justice and equity for all environmentally overburdened communities is a high priority for EPA. New guidance is intended to provide a framework of principles and practices to assist each EPA region to promote environmental justice and equity through air permitting programs using existing clean air act authorities and discretion, federal civil rights laws, as well as other federal and state laws that may help to mitigate potential adverse and disproportionate effects of a permitting action. The document includes the following 8 principles:

- 1. Identify communities with potential environmental justice concerns (especially using EJScreen)
- 2. Engage early in the permitting process to promote meaningful participation and fair treatment
- 3. Enhance public involvement throughout the permitting process (through multiple communication methods)
- 4. Conduct a "fit for purpose" environmental justice analysis
- 5. Minimize and mitigate disproportionately high and adverse effects associated with the permit action to promote fair treatment
- 6. Provide federal support throughout the air permitting process
- 7. Enhance transparency throughout the air permitting process (by documenting and addressing concerns)
- 8. Build capacity to enhance the consideration of environmental justice in the air permitting process (including co-regulators, communities and stakeholders).

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


How Can I Find Out if I Need a Permit?

Ohio EPA's **Permit Wizard** is an excellent tool designed to help individuals, companies or municipalities figure out if they need any permits or other documents for certain activities. It is anonymous, and gives general information. The easy to navigate screens move you quickly through the process and then end with permits that are recommended and contact information to move forward.

Don't Open Burn with Spring Clean-up

It's hard to imagine during the dreary days of February that Spring will be here before our next newsletter drops! But, it will, and with it will come the need to clean up all the leftover leaves and tree debris that winter gave to us. Many folks are accustomed to simply raking things in a pile and lighting that on fire. Drive around

in April & May (and Oct/Nov) and you'll undoubtedly see a smoky haze in the air. *That* is wood smoke made up of billions and billions of tiny pollutants we refer to as PM $_{2.5}$ or Fine Particle Pollution. PM $_{2.5}$ is documented to be bad for human health impacting eyes, nose, throat as simple irritants and our heart & lungs as a major negative health impactor.

Better options would be to mulch or compost the items that can be composted or have debris hauled away to an appropriate facility.




