Summit County Surveillance Data:

In Weeks 26 & 27 of influenza surveillance, influenza-related activity was low¹ in Summit County.





¹The measure of 'influenza-related activity in Summit County' will be determined based on week to week comparison of underlined table 1 indicators. The scale is as follows: 1/5 indicators increase (very low), 2/5 indicators increase (low), 3/5 indicators increase (moderate), 4/5 indicators increase (high), 5/5 indicators increase (very high).





Acute Care Hospitalizations: There were 20 reported admissions during week 26 and 14 admissions for week 27. Figure 2 displays hospitalizations in Summit County.

School absenteeism

includes absences regardless of reason. The absence rate decreased from week 26 to 27. Spring break is impacting these numbers.

0 deaths related to influenza, 4 COVID-19 related deaths and 14 pneumonia related deaths occurred in Summit County during week 26 and 27. Influenza associated deaths remained at 0, COVID-19 associated deaths decreased and pneumonia associated deaths increased.




Figure 1. Weekly Summit County death counts associated with pneumonia and influenza during 2023-2024 season

Figure 1 displays weekly counts of deaths occurring in Summit County associated with pneumonia, COVID-19 and influenza.




Figure 2. Summit County weekly influenza-associated hospitalizations, 2023-2024 season and previous five seasons

Hospitalizations: In Week 26, Summit County hospitals reported 20 influenza-associated hospitalizations, 14 hospitalizations were reported during Week 27. **Figure 2** displays weekly confirmed hospitalization counts for Summit County.





Figure 3. Weekly ED visits in Summit County related to Fever + ILI reported in EpiCenter, 2023 to 2024 season

EpiCenter collects and analyzes health related data in real time to provide information about the health of the community. This system tracks ER visits related to constitutional complaints and fever and ILI. **Figure 3** displays the weekly ER visits related to ILI and flu symptoms in Summit County. **A significant number of ER visits are expected to be unaccounted for due to limited reporting partner participation. As a result, these figures should not be compared to previous year's reports.**

National Surveillance: from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC):

National Outpatient Illness Surveillance:

Nationally, during Week 14, 2.8% of patient visits reported through ILINet were due to respiratory illness that included fever plus a cough or sore throat, also referred to as ILI. This has decreased (change of \geq 0.1 percentage points) since Week 13 and is now below the national baseline. The percentage of visits for ILI decreased in regions 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8, and remained stable in all other regions in Week 14 compared to Week 13. Regions 1, 5, and 7 are above their baseline, and all other regions are below their respective baselines. Multiple respiratory viruses are co-circulating, and the relative contribution of influenza virus infection to ILI varies by location.





Figure 6. Influenza-like illness (ILI) activity level indicator determined by data reported to ILINet 2023-24 Influenza Season Week 14 ending Apr 06, 2024 ILI Activity Level

Influenza Summary

- Influenza activity continued to decline in most countries in the Northern Hemisphere. Influenza A(H1N1pdm09) and B viruses predominated, with differences by geographical area.
- In the Southern Hemisphere, influenza activity remained low, in general, with a mix of influenza A and B viruses detected. Some countries in South America reported elevated activity and influenza A viruses were most commonly detected.





Figure 7. Proportion of sentinel specimens testing positive for influenza




Figure 9. Proportion of sentinel specimens testing positive for SARS-CoV-2

About this report: Reporting agencies include labs, hospitals, long-term care and community-based care providers, physician offices, university clinic, pharmacies, and schools. Agencies are distributed throughout Summit County and report different indicators of flu activity including total lab tests, numbers of positive tests and type, antiviral prescriptions filled, school absences, and influenza like illness (ILI). Hospitalizations are lab confirmed for influenza and are obtained from the Ohio Disease Reporting System. Number of deaths associated with influenza and pneumonia are gathered from the Summit County Office of Vital Records death listings. Emergency room visits for complaints related to influenza are obtained by syndromic surveillance system (Epicenter).

Special thanks to all agencies who report Influenza related data weekly.
