On August 28th, 2025, SCPH received continued accreditation through the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB). Receiving national accreditation represents the agency's continued efforts to innovate and maintain the highest standard of excellence and accountability to the citizens of Summit County. SCPH was the first health district in Ohio to receive accreditation which is reassessed every five years. In addition, on September 12th, 2025, SCPH received certification as a Great Place to Work® (GPTW). The certification is based on employee feedback and serves as an indicator of our agency's ongoing commitment to create a positive workplace.

As we begin 2026, SCPH will continue to provide value to the community through innovative and impactful public health services. The recently published 2025 Community Health Assessment (CHA) is an example of close community collaboration, research and awareness to factors which influence community health, and our agency's data driven approach to health intervention and services.



SCPH RECEIVES REACCREDITATION STATUS

In 2025, Summit County Public Health successfully completed the review process to maintain our national accreditation status through the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB). The non-profit PHAB works to advance and transform public health practice by championing performance improvement, strong infrastructure, and innovation. PHAB's accreditation program, which receives support from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, sets standards against which the nation's governmental public health departments can continuously

improve the quality of their services and performance.

SCPH achieved initial national accreditation status through PHAB on May 30, 2013, after undergoing a rigorous, multi-faceted, peer-reviewed assessment process to ensure it met a set of quality standards and measures. In maintaining accreditation status for another five years, SCPH has demonstrated that it meets PHAB's quality standards and measures and has the capacity to continue improving the health of the residents of Summit County.



Continuous Quality Improvement

Summit County Public Health (SCPH) is committed to building a culture of continuous quality improvement (QI) in order to provide services that are effective, efficient, and responsive to community needs. The agency's QI Plan outlines strategies that encourage innovative thinking, and an employee-led committee supports staff by helping identify, design, and carry out QI projects across programs.

In 2025, staff teams led **five** improvement projects, standardized quality improvement training for new hires, and completed an internal culture of quality self-assessment from the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) whose results will be used to guide future agency-wide quality improvement practices.

Epidemiology

- ▶ Led data collection for the 2025 Community Health Assessment (CHA) which included compiling, validating, and analyzing nearly **200** health indicators and integrating findings with additional survey and focus group data
- ▶ Developed a streamlined outbreak reporting system that standardized how external partners submit outbreak information to the agency
- ▶ Launched a new project to strengthen overdose prevention through wastewater monitoring. Weekly wastewater samples from the Akron Water Reclamation Facility are being used to provide anonymous, community level views of substance use trends, adding to SCPH's broader surveillance efforts. This information complements other data already used by SCPH and local partners, including first responders, hospitals, and community organizations, to better time outreach, naloxone distribution, and connections to treatment and recovery supports

Facilities

- ▶ Upgraded the building HVAC automation system to improve functionality, maintainability, and reliability of key building controls

ADMINISTRATIVE



Human Resources

- ▶ Summit County Public Health achieved its inaugural Great Place to Work® certification with a **78%** favorability rating from staff
- ▶ **38** posted positions were successfully filled in 2025, **30%** by internal candidates
- ▶ SCPH staff completed over **3,900** hours of internal trainings

Informatics

- ▶ Completed the COVID-19 Data Consolidation project, centralizing SCPH's pandemic response data and systems into a single Google Shared Drive repository. This effort preserved key advancements in Google Scripting and Application Design, improved long-term data retention, and streamlined access management across the agency
- ▶ Built a Measles Response System. This proactive effort focused on contact tracing, to support Clinical Health in efficiently monitoring and managing measles cases, enhancing data tracking, reporting, and overall response efforts
- ▶ Developed and implemented the Naloxone Cabinet Monitoring System (NCMS) for the Harm Reduction Program, delivering a fully automated, user-friendly Google-based system. The system features real-time dashboards, automated alerts, and complete historical data migration, improving operational efficiency, enhancing data quality, and strengthening program oversight

Information Technology

- ▶ Implemented a new access control system to improve facility security and simplify access management
- ▶ Completed significant server infrastructure upgrades to improve stability, performance, and capacity for current and future workloads
- ▶ Replaced key network infrastructure to strengthen internal connectivity and support growing demand across systems and services



Public Information and Marketing

- ▶ SCPH staff participated in **62** informational events at schools, churches, community centers and other county agencies to share public health information and resources
- ▶ Attended state and local public information officer workshops throughout the year and actively participated in emergency preparedness exercises
- ▶ Completed **14** press releases covering topics such as vaccinations, measles, mosquitos and ticks, Youth Risk Behavior Survey results, Board of Health meeting dates, cold safety, seasonal flu and the SCPH community baby shower. We also responded to **44** media requests for interviews or comments, contributing to our ongoing commitment to keeping the public informed



2025 Summit County Vital Statistics

- ▶ **6,903** Births registered
- ▶ **5,942** Deaths registered
- ▶ **4,339** Burial/transit permits issued
- ▶ 2025 saw the implementation of a state-wide vital statistics registration system from the Ohio Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics. This new system allows for more streamlined reporting and provides local health departments access to birth and death records from across the entire state

Behavioral Health Initiatives

- ▶ Served as the lead agency for a **22**-county harm reduction expansion effort and the Regional Prevention and Linkages grant funded by the Ohio Department of Health
- ▶ Facilitated multi-agency advisory and review bodies, including the Opiate Abatement Advisory Council (OAAC) and the Overdose and Suicide Fatality Review Board (OSFRB), and produced annual overdose and suicide fatality review reports summarizing trends, findings, and community-level recommendations
- ▶ Provided administrative oversight for the OAAC, supporting placement of School-Based Wellness Coordinators, advancing trauma-informed assessment recommendations, and supporting recovery-oriented community and hospital-based programs
- ▶ Participated as the only community-level agency in Ohio elected for the national Suicide Mortality Review (SMR) Academy, convening a cross-sector team to strengthen crisis response and suicide prevention strategies
- ▶ Completed specialized Retrospective Fatality Analysis (RFA) training to enhance the agency's ability to identify contributing factors to suicide and other accidental deaths and inform prevention efforts



Project D.A.W.N.

- ▶ Distributed **11,779** naloxone kits and **27,200** drug testing strips capable of detecting fentanyl, xylazine, medetomidine, using naloxone
- ▶ Supplied **1,885** naloxone kits through a partnership with the Ohio Department of Health and Ohio Department of Transportation to stock **two** vending machines located at highway rest stops in Summit County

Quick Response Team

- ▶ Akron's Quick Response Team (QRT) conducted more than **540** outreach attempts in 2025. The team includes an SCPH Certified Peer Recovery Supporter, an Akron Police Department officer, and an Akron Fire Department paramedic, making up to **three** contact attempts per client
- ▶ **113** naloxone kits were distributed to clients and family members during QRT visits
- ▶ Additional funding for outreach and engagement was obtained through a grant from the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO)



Summit Safe Harm Reduction

- ▶ Provided nearly **4,000** client interactions, distributing needs-based sterile supplies and harm reduction tools to reduce infectious disease transmission and prevent fatal overdoses
- ▶ Distributed approximately **351,600** sterile syringes and safely collected over **87,970** used syringes for proper disposal
- ▶ The Medical Director provided a weekly Wound Care Clinic to address injection-related wounds, aiming to prevent complications, promote overall health, and create a pathway for individuals to access additional healthcare services. In 2025, over **100** clients received free and compassionate care through this initiative
- ▶ Partnered with Summa Health and Cleveland Clinic Akron General Emergency Departments to offer Uber Health transportation for same-day medication-assisted treatment (MAT) initiation, removing transportation barriers and supporting timely access to treatment

Emergency Preparedness

- ▶ As an active partner with the County of Summit Special Operations Response Team, SCPH supported the search/recovery mission of persons in the Cuyahoga River by providing Emergency Preparedness staff and resources to assist the Cuyahoga Falls and Summit County dive teams
- ▶ The program provided volunteer management for local hospitals' exercises and trainings focusing on patient surge during a major disaster incident and decontamination of patients from a radiological/chemical incident
- ▶ Collaborated with the Summit County Emergency Management Agency, local hospitals, American Red Cross, local fire/EMS, local law enforcement, the Summit County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board and additional stakeholders to update the following annexes in the Summit County Emergency Operations Plan:

Clinic Services

- ▶ In 2025, the SCPH clinic facilitated **2,602** patient visits, providing essential community services such as tuberculosis screenings, reproductive healthcare, and immunizations. Notably, staff administered **1,585** immunizations and conducted **792** reproductive health visits throughout the year
- ▶ Outreach initiatives included participation in various community events to provide information on the availability of reproductive health services and the importance of preconception health with free blood pressure screenings and distribution of blood pressure cuffs

Communicable Disease

- ▶ The SCPH disease investigation team processed **8,612** reports of infectious disease throughout the year
- ▶ Expanded surveillance of Summit County wastewater monitoring to detect the presence of communicable diseases such as Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), Influenza, Measles and COVID-19. This serves as an early warning system, notifying staff of the presence of potential viral trends and outbreaks
- ▶ A new user-friendly 24/7 outbreak reporting system was implemented in 2025 and infection prevention guidance was provided for **79** outbreak investigations
- ▶ Using grant funding for HIV and STI prevention services provided by the Ohio Department of Health, staff were able to provide outreach and disseminate educational material to a network of **64** community partners and provide HIV testing for **707** individuals
- ▶ Led educational initiatives regarding the 2025 ABC's of Reportable Infectious Diseases, providing tailored guidance to high-risk environments such as daycares, schools, long-term care facilities and health care systems

Dental Services

- ▶ Dental staff completed **2,924** visits, of which **602** were new clients
- ▶ **1,700** patients received dental exams and **2,619** preventative procedures were performed

AIR QUALITY

- ▶ The Mow Greener program completed its 6th year, providing over **\$33,000** in gift card incentives which resulted in an **8** ton reduction in emissions for the year
- ▶ Received the 2025 Buckeye Community Partner Social Determinants of Health Award for our Managing Asthma Triggers at Home (MATH) program, a program for children with high-risk asthma
- ▶ Delivered technical presentations and served as subject matter experts at multiple professional association meetings and community events

FOOD SAFETY AND RECREATION

- ▶ The Food Safety and Recreation program coordinated **four** Mobile Round-up events where mobile food units could stop at the SCPH main campus for inspection and licensing prior to the festival season. A combined total of **sixty-seven** units were inspected over the four events
- ▶ Conducted **5,381** standard inspections
- ▶ Issued **3,505** food facility licenses and **82** temporary licenses
- ▶ Received and responded to **526** facility complaints
- ▶ Performed **139** food plan reviews
- ▶ **262** pool licenses, **8** camp facility licenses and **189** school facility licenses were processed
- ▶ Successfully used recalcitrant operator procedures to revoke a food service operation license for non-compliance



ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS

HEALTHY HOMES

- ▶ **298** housing complaints and **20** hotel/motel complaints received and investigated
- ▶ **935** Animal bite incidents or exposures investigated
- ▶ Investigated **210** childhood lead poisoning cases
- ▶ **57** mosquito complaints received and investigated
- ▶ Performed **62** ultra-low volume pesticide spray applications within Summit County to assist with mosquito control
- ▶ Collaborated with Summit County Children's Services to establish a referral process for lead poisoning cases
- ▶ The Body Art program, in collaboration with the facilitators of the Rubber City Tattoo Invitational in Akron, completed **80** temporary inspections on the first day of the event

SOLID WASTE

- ▶ Collected and aided in the incineration of **5,190** pounds of unused medications through our community Dispose of Unused Medications Properly (DUMP) program
- ▶ Completed **86** open burning/fugitive dust investigations
- ▶ Received **296** asbestos notifications and performed **152** inspections
- ▶ Performed **217** Right to Know inspections, **77** landfill/solid waste facility inspections, **22** compost facility inspections and **75** scrap tire generator inspections
- ▶ Successfully abated and closed **20** solid waste open/illegal dumping complaints
- ▶ Responded to **247** open records requests

WATER QUALITY

- ▶ Received **347** new complaints, **324** complaints were abated, **15** public health orders were issued and **7** cases were referred to legal counsel for escalated enforcement
- ▶ Issued **282** private water system permits, **316** sewage treatment system installation permits and **17,058** home sewage treatment system operation permits
- ▶ Reviewed **335** building & zoning evaluations and **2,104** private point of sale evaluations
- ▶ Screened **1,362** storm water outfalls
- ▶ Began enforcement on delinquent service contracts and closed **4** ongoing legal cases



CREATING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES GRANT

- ▶ Partnered with Akron Parks Collaborative and Sherbondy Hill residents to improve facilities at Sherbondy Park, ensuring intergenerational accessibility to the recreational space
- ▶ Completed a Healthy Eating and Active Living Assessment to pinpoint gaps and priority projects in the City of Akron regarding resident access to healthy food and physical activity

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL GRANT

- ▶ Implemented education and encouragement activities to promote “walking and rolling” to school instead of car drop-off, thereby increasing students’ physical activity and reducing hazardous vehicle traffic during school drop-off and pick-up times. Over **6,000** students were impacted through the education and encouragement activities implemented across ten Akron Public School locations

FULL TERM FIRST BIRTHDAY INITIATIVE

- ▶ In partnership with Summit County Jobs and Family Services and alongside Full Term First Birthday partners, organized a community baby shower which provided essential baby items and connections to social services to **321** families with infants under one-year old
- ▶ Facilitated **1,495** resource connections for pregnant individuals or those with a child under one-year old through a partnership with United Way of Summit and Medina County
- ▶ Hosted the third annual Wave of Light community ceremony to respectfully honor the lives of infants lost before their first birthday



HOMELESS YOUTH GRANT


- ▶ Connected with approximately **1,500** homeless youth across Summit County, facilitating access to housing, drop-in center services, case management, support services, rental and utility assistance, and referrals to health and behavioral health resources

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH

- ▶ Provided case management to over **1,600** families through the Ohio Children with Medical Handicaps program
- ▶ Conducted **500** home visits via the Help Me Grow Home Visiting program, offering positive parenting education
- ▶ Completed **546** Healthchek outreach connections to emphasize the importance of well-child visits and immunizations and ensure service follow-up
- ▶ The Neighborhood Navigation program effectively reached **403** pregnant individuals in 2025. This engagement resulted in **1,260** referrals, connecting clients to vital resources such as prenatal care, baby supplies, transportation, and social support. Additionally, the Maternal and Child Health team participated in over **30** community events to build relationships and engage individuals who had not yet accessed the program's services

OFFICE OF MINORITY HEALTH

- ▶ Hosted **two** major community events: a health fair at the METRO transit center and a community baby shower in partnership with CareSource, Full Term First Birthday, and Akron Pregnancy Services. These activities connected over **140** community members with vital resources and services. This work was instrumental in raising awareness of local health resources and strengthening community partnerships throughout Summit County
- ▶ Programming within the Office of Minority Health engaged a total of **705** individuals through outreach efforts



FAMILY HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS



SENIOR AND ADULT SERVICES

- ▶ Conducted **15** educational training sessions focused on essential topics including dementia, brain health, hoarding and the Gatekeeper Program, engaging a total of **525** participants
- ▶ Delivered services, outreach and education to over **1,200** older adults, adults with disabilities, caregivers, and professionals throughout Summit County
- ▶ Hosted a highly successful virtual hoarding conference, which specifically addressed pet hoarding. The event drew approximately **300** individuals from across the state

TOBACCO PREVENTION GRANT

- ▶ Conducted **70** youth vaping prevention presentations within local schools and reached over **250,000** residents with tobacco cessation messaging
- ▶ Hosted an Advocacy through Art event at the Akron Art Museum with over **108** art pieces which attracted over **700** attendees
- ▶ Enrolled **19** participants in the Moms Quit for Two Tobacco Cessation Program and facilitated **100** counseling sessions to support smoking cessation efforts

WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC) PROGRAM

- ▶ Completed **29,578** WIC appointments, which included certifying **1,366** pregnant and **1,830** postpartum participants
- ▶ In 2025, the average breastfeeding initiation rate by participants increased from **71%** to **72.5%** and the rate of participants continuing to breastfeed at **6** months increased by **3.7%**
- ▶ WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program distributed **300** coupon packets valued at **\$30** each across **two** community markets. A total of **\$6,710.00** in coupon benefits were redeemed by local farmers, a **75%** redemption rate




Summary of Mentions
